

# ADVISING WORKSHEET: OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

#### **GENERAL NOTES**

- A minimum of 123 credits are required for graduation.
- Credits earned for COM 100 and MAT 100 do not count toward the 123 credits required for graduation; however, COM 100 students may petition for elective credit.
- Where appropriate, courses required for the major can be used to satisfy General Education requirements. However, the credits earned for these courses are applied to either Gen Ed requirements or the major, not both.
- Paths of Knowledge coursework may count towards major or minor requirements, but may not fulfill a second Mid-Level Liberal Arts Exploration requirement.
- Students are expected to follow the catalogue requirements for General Education, the major, and additional requirements.
- A minor or second major within the areas listed under Paths of Knowledge automatically fulfills that area of the Gen Ed requirements.

#### **MAJOR NOTES**

1. OT courses must be taken in sequence.

2. All majors must achieve a final grade of "C" or better in all undergraduate OT courses and related required courses, a grade of "P" in OT Fieldwork practicum courses (OT FW). Students must maintain an overall GPA of 3.0 in the undergraduate phase of the major. In the graduate phase, a final grade of "B" or better in all graduate level courses and an overall GPA of 3.0 at the graduate level are required.

3. The repeat/delete option may be used 3 times total for grades below a "C" in OT and related required courses or an "F" in OT FW II. This option may be used one time for any one course. If the repeat/delete option does not result in a grade of "C" or higher or "P" in FW II, the student will be dismissed from the program. The accumulation of more than three grades below a "C" or an "F" in FW II will result in dismissal from the program.

4. Students are required to submit to the University, the OT Program, and to fieldwork centers (as applicable): proof of health physical and immunization records, proof of ownership of current, valid health/accident insurance coverage and certification in Cardiac Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) (infant, child adult and AED), and First Aid. OT majors must also obtain request for criminal record check (ACT 151) and Pennsylvania Child Abuse History clearance forms and/or resident state clearances (ACT 34) prior to beginning any clinical education Fieldwork Level I and/or II). Additionally, all OT students must complete FBI fingerprint clearances. Students will receive separate letters outlining the timeline for completion of such requirements. In addition, clinical sites may request medical clearances, immunization records, and/or the results of drug tests.

5. Students who have an unclear record and/or a misdemeanor or felony conviction on their record will not be allowed to any clinical fieldwork experience. Students who are unable to complete fieldwork experiences will not be able to complete the course and as such, the Program. The OT program cannot guarantee Level I or Level II Fieldwork placements for individuals with arrest or criminal records. Students with a history of a conviction or arrest should speak immediately to the Program Director to discuss other options for study.

6. Students are subject to drug and alcohol testing. Students who do not pass tests may also be denied entrance into clinical and fieldwork sites. As noted with unclear records and/or criminal convictions, students who are unable to complete clinical fieldwork experiences will be unable to complete the program and will be ineligible to sit for the certification exam and licensure. Again, the Program cannot guarantee Level I or Level II Fieldwork placements for students with positive tests. Students should speak immediately with the Occupational Therapy Program Director for further advising.

7. All Level II Fieldwork must be completed in sequence and within 24 months following completion of the didactic portion of the program.

8. Students with a health or physical challenge may be asked to obtain a physician's statement that the condition will not be aggravated by or endanger clients/patients associated with the student in required coursework and field work experiences. Reasonable accommodations will be made for students to meet ADA regulations.
