

# ADVISING WORKSHEET: PSYCHOLOGY & COUNSELING- MACC

#### **GENERAL NOTES**

- A minimum of 123 credits are required for graduation.
- Credits earned for COM 100 and MAT 100 do not count toward the 123 credits required for graduation; however, COM 100 students may
  petition for elective credit.
- Where appropriate, courses required for the major can be used to satisfy General Education requirements. However, the number of credits earned for these courses are applied to either Gen Ed requirements or the major, not both.
- Paths of Knowledge coursework may count towards major or minor requirements, but may not fulfill a second Mid-Level Liberal Arts
   Exploration requirement.
- Students are expected to follow the catalog requirements for General Education, the major, and additional requirements.
- A minor or second major within the areas listed under Paths of Knowledge automatically fulfills that area of the Gen Ed requirements.

# **Notes for PSY/MACC Major:**

- BS in PSY (123 credits) awarded at the end of the 3.5 years. The MACC curriculum comprises of 60 credits. (In case students decide not to continue to MACC, they will need to complete 9 credits of electives to complete 123 credits required for Bachelor's degree.)
- In order to enter the MACC Program within the accelerated program format, students must complete the following pre-admission criteria by the completion of their junior year (beginning of semester 6).
  - Overall GPA of 3.00 and a Psychology GPA of 3.00 (no PSY grade below a C).
  - Once students declare their intention to pursue the accelerated track, all MACC prerequisite courses (listed below) must be taken at a four-year accredited institution. If taken at another institution, only courses in which the student achieved a grade of "C" or higher will be accepted for the MACC requirements.
  - The repeat/delete option may be used only once for any MACC prerequisite course.
  - Students who have met the progression requirements will confirm their decision to accept their seat within the MACC Program
    by January 15 of the beginning of Semester 6, through written notification (letter of intent) to the MACC Program Director.

# PREREQUISITES FOR MACC:

- 3 Courses: Introduction to Psychology, Psychopathology, Statistics or Research.
- GPA: 3.0

# **Admissions Information:**

Bridge PSYCH and MACC Program Admission

Decisions regarding admission into the university will be made by the Office of Admissions. Admission into the PSYCH MACC bridge program (6 years) will be available to students who meet the criteria (3.0 high school GPA, 1100 SAT). Upon timely completion of ALL admission criteria, applicants will be offered admission into the university, and conditional admission into the graduate MACC Program, as determined by the maximum number of allotted seats in the program set by the university. Students within the accelerated bridge (6 years) format will follow a curricular plan in PSYCH, with MACC listed as the student's second major. At the beginning of semester 6, students submit a letter of intent to proceed into the MACC program to the MACC program director. Admission into the MACC program will be determined by the MACC admissions committee in accordance with the university admissions policies.

# **MAJOR NOTES**

-BIO 109 is recommended. MAT 208 is the required Math course.

-CLEARANCES: In the semester before the practicum, the student must obtain appropriate background clearances. If the clearances are not on file in the Academic Compliance Office prior to the first day of the semester, the student will not be allowed to enroll in the practicum. If the student fails a clearance, the course instructor will attempt to place the student in a practicum which does not require a clearance. The practicum agency makes the final decision regarding acceptance of a student with their organization.

-Any student participating in an experiential component of the program (ex. Research with a faculty member, service-learning course, volunteer experience) may be required to obtain background clearances prior to participating.

# In-depth Disciplinary Study (DS)

Three courses at the 200-400 level in one Liberal Arts discipline other than one's major, guided by common ideas and methods of inquiry. Students choose from Art, Biology, Chemistry, Communication, Computer Science, Economics, English, History, Mathematics, Music, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, Theology, Theatre or World Languages. This path may be used to give students a firm foundation in a discipline supporting their chosen major, or to pursue an interest in one of the Liberal Arts disciplines.
